

### ***Senior Center Planter Update***

Two years ago the Club chose to adopt the planter in front of the Senior Center on Maple Street. Sally Naish ran a series of workshops on design, which several members attended, with the final challenge being to design the planter for the Senior Center. Jan Ford's design was voted the winner by the group. However, due to construction plans by the Town, the Club has had to put the planter work on hold.

Construction on the drive in front of the Senior Center is nearly complete at this writing. The curved driveway area has been regraded to eliminate the puddles that constantly appeared when it rained; the bricks will be replaced by concrete for safety reasons; and the planter area has been made a bit smaller by 3 pools (rain garden approach) being added inside the planter area.



This work has impacted the original design, and after the first of the year the Club's Board will revisit the project: Can the AGC still adopt the planter and, if so, what modifications can be made to the original design? Things are in limbo right now, so stay tuned for further information.

Water Conservation – Karen MacKinnon, Environment Chair

With all the rain -- and now snow! -- that we've been having recently, it seems like water conservation should not be a concern here in Massachusetts.

However, this is not the case.



Our area has relatively shallow aquifers, so even a short time of drought can adversely affect our water supply. With summers becoming hotter and periods of drought becoming more frequent, our residential population, as well as the populations of our natural ecosystems, are affected.

Ways we can help:

- When replacing items such as toilets (did you know that toilets account for 24% of indoor water use?!), washing machines, *etc.* choose high efficiency models
- Repair leaks as soon as possible
- Don't run water continuously at sinks
- Rather than using a garbage disposal, put food waste in a compost pile or consider using a curbside pick-up program (There are 4 companies operating in Arlington.)

There are many ways we can help conserve water outdoors as well, but that is a topic for another day.

Let's all do our part to help with water conservation and efficiency in our state so that Massachusetts can continue to be a beautiful place for future generations.
